DOCUMENTS YOU MUST HAVE

1 Passport

Provide a valid passport with at least 6-8 month validity for all K-1 and K-2 visa applicants.

3 Birth certificates

Birth Certificates of all applicants. Some embassies require birth certificates of children under 21 even if they apply for a K-2 visa "follow to join" later.

5 Police clearance Reports

Provide all required PC from each applicant over age 16. Additional PCs from countries if you lived there for 6+ months after age 16.

7 I-134 Affidavit of Support

Affidavit of Support and supporting documents. Include: tax returns, paystubs, bank statements, letter of employment if necessary. This applies to a joint sponsor as well. Each applicant including K-2 children need to be supported.

9 Proof of Relationship

Compilation of your primary and secondary evidence to show you're a genuine couple. See how to prepare proof of relationship for the visa interview.

11 Proof of Interview Appointment

Proof your appointment is scheduled for that day. An email printout or a notice from the embassy (USTravelDocs.com or AIS.US-visa.info) is acceptable

2 Passport style photos

Provide recent 2"x2" passport style photos for all K-1 and K-2 visa applicants.

4 DS-160 Confirmation page

Confirmation page with barcode & number

6 Medical Exam Report

Bring the sealed medical report. Sometimes the physician will deliver the report directly to the Embassy. K-2 children have separate reports.

8 Proof of Visa Fee payment

Evidence that you paid the visa fee for all applicants. This includes proof of biometrics (if required) done before the interview. You can pay through various methods (online, in person, or through a bank).

10 Approval Notice I-797

Your I-129F and NVC approval letters (I-797). This is good to have as a backup although not explicitly required containing your case number and details.

Documents Required by a specific Embassy

1 Specific Embassy Requirements

Certain documents apply specifically to your country or Embassy. Check USEmbassy.gov for specific requirements. For example: in the Philippines, you need a CENOMAR. In Brazil, you need the "marriageable statement certificate". Note that not all Embassies require such documents.

Documents you MAY need

1 Previous US Travel Documents

If the beneficiary or K-2 children have been to the US or applied for previous visas. Including, but not limited to: visa applications, deportations, Customs, bars, Green cards, etc.

2 Divorce / Death documents

All documents if the beneficiary or petitioner have been divorced or have had deaths of former spouses.

3 Name Change evidence

If you've had a name change due to marriage, divorce, adoption, legal court order, etc. Birth certificates and passports are important for these.

4 Custody of Children

If applicable, bring custody agreement documents if K-2 visa children are under age. This may include parental consent forms.

5 Adoption Documents

If either the beneficiary or his/her K-2 children have been adopted.

6 Prison or Court Records

If the beneficiary or K-2 children have police, court or prison records. Information should be clear, complete, and match with the DS-160.

7 Military Service

If you served or are discharged from military service.

8 Originals, certified copies, notarizations, translations, etc

All documents must be as required by the Embassy. Many times you must bring the original + photocopy. Follow the rules from their instructions. If needed, get them notarized, certified or translated.

9 Special Statements

Sometimes the US Consulate specifically ask for a written statement in regards to something crucial. Common examples include you being aware of the beneficiary's pregnancy. The Consular officer directs you at your interview which statements they require specifically.

10 Copy of I-129F packet

Although not required, it's a good idea to bring a copy of your I-129F packet for backup.
